The First 5 Minutes:



Impressions Matter in Property Management BY WENDY WRIGHT

ake considered himself a seasoned landlord. With a portfolio of single-family rentals and a couple duplexes, he has weathered tenant turnovers, tricky maintenance calls, and the ups and downs of the rental market. He knew the numbers, managed his cash flow, and could charge fair market rents without a struggle. But one thing he hadn't truly grasped was how important the first five minutes are to prospective applicants — until one experience forced him to rethink everything.

When Mark and Jenna arrived to tour his 2-story townhome, they were hopeful. The online photos showed a cozy, updated kitchen, a fenced backyard, and spacious living areas - exactly what they'd been searching for. But as they pulled into the driveway, their excitement started to fade.

The lawn was not mowed, weeds were overgrown, and the porch light was missing a lightbulb. Inside, the undesirable scent of pet odor lingered in the air. The floors were clean-ish, but the dusty baseboards told a different story. Jenna found a forgotten jar of peanut butter in the pantry closet and was quickly put off by the sticky kitchen floor.

The second floor was exactly what Mark and Jenna had hoped for. Three bedrooms, a master bath, lots of closet space, and — best of all — a washer and dryer conveniently located at the top of the stairs. Jenna was anticipating how easy laundry day would be without hauling baskets up and down.

But as she reached for the bifold doors to check out the appliances, one bifold popped off track, falling against the other. She tried to close it again and jammed it. Mark chuckled at first, but the charm was guickly wearing off.

As they continued to move from room to room, Jenna began noticing the smaller details, layers of dust clinging to the ceiling fans, hand prints along the edges of the bedroom doors and a dusty exhaust fan in the hall bathroom. It was those little details that told a bigger story: if no one had bothered to clean what was obvious, what else had been overlooked?

The showing went on — but Jake could tell Jenna was quickly losing interest and was no longer picturing herself living there. She was mentally adding up the problems as they made their way back to the front door.

With anticipation, Jake ask the question, "Are you interested?" Sure enough, the questions followed.

"Can something be done about the smell?"
"Is someone coming to fix that closet door?"
"Was it cleaned?"

Worried of losing this lead, Jake assured Jenna everything would be taken care of before moving in. However, the damage was done

and Jenna already made up her mind - this wasn't the home for her.

Mark and Jenna declined a few days later, forcing Jake back to chasing new prospects. Weeks went by before he finally filled the vacancy, settling for a less-qualified tenant and spending the next year dealing with minor complaints, ongoing maintenance calls, and a bad turnover that cost him nearly three months' rent.

Lesson Learned: The Details Matter

In real estate, small decisions often lead to big outcomes. Nowhere is this more evident than in the critical first five minutes a prospective tenant spends viewing a rental property. In those few moments, opinions are formed, expectations are set, and a decision is quietly made — long before lease agreements are signed. What follows merely reinforces that initial impression, for better or worse.

Savvy property managers and landlords understand that presentation is paramount in the rental business. In fact, it's no different from any other retail or service experience: people buy with their eyes first. A presentable property doesn't just attract better tenants; it lays the groundwork for a more stable, long-term tenancy.

A rental property should reflect the same care and pride as a homeowner's personal residence. Anything less sends a clear message: "This property is managed with indifference."

A Costly First Impression

The quickest way to jeopardize a tenancy is to leave issues unresolved before move-in day. Tenants shouldn't be picking up the phone in their first week to report a running toilet, a leaky faucet, or a refrigerator that doesn't cool. Signs of a hurried or careless turnover are just as concerning — dusty blinds, dirty baseboards, or crumbs in kitchen drawers.

These oversights immediately erode trust and satisfaction. The frustration of dealing with maintenance vendors and lingering repairs while trying to settle in breeds resentment. And once a tenant starts out unhappy, no amount of goodwill can fully erase that initial disappointment.


Invest Now to Save Later

If You Bought a Used Car, Get a Battery Test ASAP

mericans are forecasted to buy millions of used cars in 2025, despite rising used car prices and market uncertainty. Americans bought 2.88 million used cars in the first three months of 2025, according to reports from industry analysts at Cox Automotive. That retail sales volume beats their 2025 forecasts, which were revised to between 37.6 million and 38 million used cars sold in the year ahead.

If you're buying a used car in 2025, there's one car part you should probably replace on your new vehicle as soon as you get the key: The car battery.

That said, the used car might be in great shape even if the battery isn't. Most mechanics inspecting a used car before purchase may skip the car battery because it's not a deal breaker. They're looking for critical reasons not to buy the car, such as knocking noises in the engine or burnt-smelling transmission fluid. Now, a technician may recommend replacing the battery if they see it's older than four years. (Most car batteries last 3-5 years.) The truth is, you may need to replace it much sooner.

If you just bought a used car, get a battery test at a reliable repair shop or favorite battery store.

Weak batteries may even be expected when you buy a used car. Here's why.

Used cars may sit idle for several days, which can hurt the car battery.

As we've explained elsewhere, car batteries need the occasional drive. Used cars, on the other hand, are more valuable with low

mileage. Of course, most dealerships won't drive their fleet around to keep the battery from getting weak by sitting unused.

Instead, that's what reconditioning repairs are for. Recon fixes improve a vehicle's condition, including fixing dents, windshield cracks, oil changes and more. (They may replace the battery if the car won't start. We'll talk about that next.)

After the restorating, a used car may sit for days or weeks waiting for its next owner. Occasional, 15-minute test drives might be the only time the alternator gets to work — and those short drives aren't enough to give the battery a healthy charge.

Used cars may have refurbished batteries, which may not last in the long run.

During reconditioning, the tech may have found the battery was mostly dead already — and replaced it with a refurbished battery.

Refurbished batteries are car batteries on an extra life. They may have failed or have significant wear and tear — and still be able to conduct electricity. High-quality refurbished batteries can pass conductance tests, not just voltmeter tests. That said, they're not ideal in the long run because they may not withstand much more wear and tear.

They're ideal for car dealerships to keep your car's purchase price lower. However, the used car may have sat idle for weeks. That's hard on any battery. Add that idle time to an already-worn battery and you've got a risky battery situation.

To make matters worse, that worn battery may have sat idle for weeks in the heat.

Used cars may sit parked in the heat all day, which also hurts the car battery.

Temperatures hotter than 90 degrees F can wear down car batteries, even if they're just sitting in a used car lot.

Heat is a slow problem. It's different from how a battery can suddenly die in winter. Heat steadily weakens batteries by causing water to evaporate from the electrolyte inside. That leaves a more-acidic mixture right beside the sensitive components. Corrosion that might have taken years can happen in several extremely hot days.

Runaway corrosion on the battery reduces how much charge a car battery can hold. It's like a worn out phone battery that only lasts five minutes after hours of recharging. Pretty soon, the car battery can't hold enough power to start the engine, even if it's been recharged well.

Heat leaves lasting damage hidden on car batteries.

Even if your used car starts now, there's no guarantee it can handle a slight temperature drop in a few months.

That's why it's so important to get a battery test as soon as you get the title and registration for your used car.

Does a bad battery mean I got a bad deal on my used car?

Not at all. Sitting unused for days, in the heat, with a used battery — that's hard on any car or truck. Used cars are just more vulnerable to battery issues because they're between owners.



The techs who restored your used car or truck were focused on more critical issues to make sure the vehicle runs. Car batteries, while they're critical to every drive, are designed to be replaced. Most batteries last three to five years, and if your used car is 12 years old, it might be time for a new battery.

Now that the car is yours, you can treat it well with a premium, long-lasting battery. ●

This Act made water pollution crimes a national focus as laws were enacted which fined polluters and enforced penalties.

The term "Riverkeeper" came into existence, and in 1983 the first such organization, "The Hudson Riverkeeper" became a branded trademark. In the late 1990s Waterkeeper Alliance was formed to carry forward that brand which now represents a global movement of community-based advocates united for clean, healthy, and abundant water for all people and the planet. In the early 2000s, there were 100 such organizations in the United States while today there over 300 organizations across the globe protecting over 5.9 million square miles of waterways.

Close to home. Lower Susquehanna Riverkeeper Association is licensed to carry the trademark of Waterkeeper Alliance and is dedicated to improving the ecological health of the Lower



Susquehanna River Watershed and the Chesapeake Bay. The Lower Susquehanna Riverkeeper works to improve the health of our River through education, research, advocacy, and legal action.

Lower Susquehanna Riverkeeper Association was licensed in 2006 as a nonprofit organization. The territory in which they monitor pollution covers the entire Lower Susquehanna Watershed from Selinsgrove, Pennsylvania to the Chesapeake Bay at Havre de Grace, Maryland. The organization also covers the

Juniata Watershed. encompassing over 8,500 square miles of land and water. Their work stays vital to our health-human, animal, bird, and aquatic life are all affected by the Susquehanna River. "Protecting the River today for future generations is critical to our work," according to Ted Evgeniadis, who serves as the Lower Susquehanna

Riverkeeper and the organization's Executive Director. "People support the River for varied reasons, but it is imperative that everyone understands that the River is not an infinite resource and needs protected."

Today, railroads and vehicular traffic cross and parallel the River's 444 miles from Cooperstown, New York to the mouth of the Chesapeake Bay in Havre de Grace, Maryland—including 200 bridges. Extraordinarily important to commerce as well as the quality of life of millions of people who live, work and/or play on the River, the Susquehanna is the longest river on the East Coast, a one-of-a-kind natural beauty and deserves our manifold preservation efforts.

In York County alone, there are daily threats to the River and the tributaries that flow into it. Fun, educational, and hands-on initiatives such as these help to promote engagement with the organization's mission:

Looking Ahead



Trail Blazing Forward: Hanover Trolley Trail Extends Its Reach

he Hanover Trolley Trail has prepared for its most ambitious expansion yet. This community asset is about to grow by nearly two miles—bringing even more outdoor adventure to residents throughout the region.

The projects will seamlessly connect the trail from Gitts Run Road all the way to Jacobs Mill Road, transforming what was once just a dream into a \$1.9 million reality.

What makes this expansion remarkable is the community spirit behind it. The project has garnered support from an impressive coalition of funders, including the PA Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program, PA Department of Conservation & Natural Resources' Keystone Fund, York County Marcellus Shale Fund, Explore York, J. William Warehime Foundation, and Powder Mill Foundation. It illustrates how much this trail means to the region that so many organizations stepped up to make it happen.

The momentum doesn't stop there. In a display of local government cooperation, Heidelberg Township recently donated a generous 12-acre parcel along Route 116 to the York County Rail Trail Authority. This strategic gift has already sparked plans for a \$1.4 million enhancement project featuring a new parking lot and

an elegant boardwalk-bridge connection—with a grant application already submitted to help fund this exciting addition.

But perhaps the most inspiring aspect of the Hanover Trolley Trail's success story is the grassroots support from surrounding communities. Hanover and Spring Grove boroughs, along with Penn and Jackson townships, rolled up their sleeves in 2024, contributing an astounding \$17,207 worth of labor and equipment to keep the trail in pristine condition. Volunteers even beautified the entrance garden at the Jackson Township parking lot, proving that when communities come together, beautiful things happen.

The trail isn't just about recreation—it's becoming an outdoor classroom too. This spring, the Oil Creek restoration site attracted curious minds from York College of Pennsylvania and Dickinson College. Engineering students explored the nearly completed phase one restoration in February, while Dickinson's Alliance for Aquatic Resource Monitoring students got their hands dirty sampling aquatic life in March. Their five-year monitoring commitment will provide valuable insights into how restoration efforts impact local ecosystems.

As residents look toward the trail reaching Jacobs Mill Road by year's end, there's genuine excitement in the air. This isn't just another construction project—it's the expansion of a community treasure that brings families together, provides healthy recreation opportunities, and showcases the natural beauty of York County.

The Hanover Trolley Trail represents the best of what happens when vision meets determination, and public support meets private generosity. With each mile of new trail surface, the community isn't just building pathways through the landscape—they're creating connections that will strengthen the area for generations to come.


