

his sculptor's destiny was sealed in fourth grade when he glimpsed Michelangelo's Davidnow his monumental works grace battlefields and museums across America.

In the shadow of Gettysburg's monuments, where cannon fire once thundered, Gary Lynn Casteel sculpts history—one chisel stroke at a time. From a two-room schoolhouse in West Virginia coal country to national recognition as a master sculptor, Gary's life is as monumental as the statues he creates.

Born in 1946 in the coal country hollows of West Virginia, Gary was the baby of his family with six brothers and one sister. His early years were spent in a modest two-room schoolhouse heated by a wood stove, where outhouses served as restrooms and water came from a hand pump. Despite these humble beginnings, Gary possessed something that would change everything—an unwavering vision of his future.

"I knew what I wanted to be when I saw a picture of Michelangelo's David in the fourth grade," Gary recalls. That pivotal moment would eventually take him from the West Virginia coal mines to the prestigious galleries and battlefields where his works now

From Pick and Shovel to Chisel and Hammer

After attending high school in Kingwood, West Virginia, Gary worked alongside his father and brothers in the coal mines, blasting and shoveling coal to help pay the local company store bills. When graduation arrived, his father expected him to follow the family tradition and make mining his career. But Gary had different plans.

"My Daddy said I should come down to the mines and get a job as my brothers did," Gary remembers. "I told him I did not want to do that, because I wanted to be a sculptor. Daddy said, "What the 'hell' is that?""

With encouragement from his teachers but no money for art school, Gary took a leap of faith that would lead him on an incredible journey. Divine providence seemed to guide his path when he encountered Giovanni and Frederico Pucci of Pietrasanta, Italy—master marble carvers whose family legacy spans generations. "We clicked like farm boys," Gary says of meeting the celebrated sculptors. "I cut marble with them for several months, and later found myself in Italy working with them, creating art pieces for the Papacy!"

Master of His Craft

Gary Casteel never attended any formal art classes, instead he gained experience through working alongside American and European sculptors. This hands-on education with masters of the Renaissance tradition shaped his distinctive style, which captures the classical elegance of European artistry while celebrating uniquely American stories.


His gallery and studio at 789 Baltimore Street in Gettysburg offers visitors a rare opportunity to witness the sculpting process firsthand. Gary welcomes guests to his workspace, explaining the intricate steps involved in transforming an idea into a lasting monument.

"Painting a picture is the easy stuff," Gary explains with characteristic enthusiasm. "Sculpting is a totally different game. The Good Lord gave me the ability to do it all, and I just love doing speaking engagements explaining how one gets to the point I am now in enjoying my life."

History in Bronze

Located right here in Gettysburg, one of Gary's most renowned works is the 1998 equestrian statue of General James Longstreet. Unlike any other monument in the park, it stands at ground level in Pitzer Woods which is located along the southern end of Seminary Ridge. This unique perspective invites visitors to encounter history up close and face to face.

The emotional impact of Gary's work extends far beyond artistic appreciation. During the creation of the Longstreet monument, an unforgettable moment occurred when the general's granddaughter, Jamie Longstreet, visited the studio. Climbing a ladder to



examine the newly sculpted face, she began to cry. Through her tears, she told Gary, "I never thought I would see him alive."

Gary's portfolio includes an impressive array of commissioned works spanning the nation. His sculptures grace locations from the Joint Chiefs of Staff Library at the Pentagon to presidential libraries, and from historic battlefields to veteran memorials. Notable projects include the Kentucky State Memorial at Vicksburg National Military Park and monuments honoring figures from the Revolutionary War through modern conflicts.

Where the Past Lives On

Gary's deep passion for American history, particularly the Civil War era, is evident in every piece he creates. His gallery features monument replicas, works in progress, and historical artifacts that bring visitors faceto-face with the past. Whether creating a life-size veteran's memorial for Lock Haven, Pennsylvania, or crafting collectible historical figures, Gary approaches each project as "a labor of love and dedication."

Gary's commitment as a sculptor extends beyond individual commissions. A portion of proceeds from his monument replica sales supports preservation efforts for the original

monuments here in Gettysburg.

Speaking History Into Life

Gary's talents extend beyond the studio through his speaking engagements at colleges, universities, Civil War round tables, and historical sites across the country. His presentations blend artistic insight with historical knowledge, captivating audiences from Gettysburg College to West Virginia University.

These speaking opportunities allow Gary to share not just technical expertise but also his remarkable personal journey—from a coal miner's son to internationally recognized artist. His story resonates with audiences, demonstrating how determination, divine guidance, and his unwavering vision transformed his dreams into reality.

Today, visitors to Gary's Baltimore Street studio discover more than just an art gallerythey find a living workshop where history takes shape. Visitors appreciate Gary's willingness to spend time with them, sharing his artistic process and the stories behind his works. Young children especially benefit from his patient explanations of sculpting techniques, hopefully inspiring the next generation of artists and history enthusiasts.



Gary's recent projects include Gettysburg's High Water Mark monument replica that sold out quickly due to popular demand, and an ambitious true-to-life sized threefigure monument for Lyons, New York. From those humble beginnings in West Virginia's coal country to his current status as one of America's premier historical sculptors, Gary embodies the power of pursuing one's calling. Now a proud resident of Gettysburg, he continues his mission of preserving American heritage through art that speaks across

generations.

Continuing the Casteel legacy, Gary's son, David, operates Valley Arts Publishing, the exclusive publisher of his father's acclaimed works. Located just outside the scenic town of Kingwood, West Virginia—less than 25 miles

from Morgantown—this family-run fine art foundry produces a wide selection of Gary Casteel's Civil War monument replicas, historical plagues, and fine art prints. What began in 2003 as a premier fine art printmaker has grown into a full-service operation offering mold making, casting, and print-on-demand services for artists nationwide. Valley Arts Publishing is proud to offer free shipping within the continental United States, and welcomes both serious collectors and casual enthusiasts to explore its online store, where American history and fine art meet in every piece.

Decades after that fourth-grade glimpse of Michelangelo's David, Gary Lynn Casteel doesn't just sculpt heroes—he's become one in his own right. Through bronze and marble, he's carved his destiny, one story, one statue, one soul at a time.



Powering Through Eight Decades:

Adams Electric Cooperative Celebrates 85 Years of Community Connections

When 65 concerned farmers and rural residents gathered in 1940 to form what would become Adams Electric Cooperative, they had a simple yet revolutionary vision: bring reliable electricity to their neighbors through the power of cooperation. Eighty-five years later, that same spirit of community partnership continues to light up south-central Pennsylvania.

FROM HUMBLE BEGINNINGS TO MODERN MARVEL

It's 1940 and rural Pennsylvania families are still relying on kerosene lamps and wood-burning stoves while their neighbors enjoy the conveniences of electric power. The Rural Electrification Administration (REA), a federal program, changed everything. Those pioneering founders saw an opportunity and seized it, establishing Adams Electric Cooperative with headquarters in Gettysburg.

The cooperative's first milestone came swiftly. By 1941, they had secured their initial REA loan and began stringing those first crucial miles of power lines across Adams County. What started to serve 543 charter members is now a thriving cooperative powering over 34,700 homes, farms, and businesses across five counties: Adams, Cumberland, Franklin, Perry, and York.

THE CO-OP DIFFERENCE: POWER TO THE PEOPLE

What makes Adams Electric truly special isn't just the electricity flowing through nearly 3,000 miles of power lines—it's the cooperative business model that puts members first. Unlike investor-owned utilities focused on shareholder profits, Adams Electric operates on seven fundamental cooperative principles that prioritize community benefit over bottom lines.

As a member-owned, not-for-profit organization, every

consumer is also an owner, called members, with voting rights in the cooperative's direction. This means decisions are made locally by member-owners who don't just live and work in these communities—they're also the very people receiving the services. When you're both a member and an owner, you have a real stake in making sure things work right for your neighbors and yourself. When Adams Electric invests in infrastructure improvements or community programs, those benefits stay right here at home rather than flow to distant investors.

CURRENT CONNECTIONS: SERVING TODAY'S NEEDS

Today's Adams Electric looks remarkably different from the startup of 1940. The cooperative, still headquartered in Gettysburg (but at a new location), also maintains district offices in Shippensburg, and York, serving a diverse mix of residential, agricultural, commercial and industrial customers. With competitive rates that run about 18% below Pennsylvania's average, Adams Electric proves that the cooperative model delivers both value and reliability.

The cooperative has earned recognition for its commitment to customer satisfaction, recently receiving honors from the American Customer Satisfaction Index. But perhaps more impressive are the community programs that reflect those original cooperative values: Project Helping Hand provides assistance to members facing financial hardship, while the Community Loan Fund supports local economic development. Educational initiatives include high school scholarships, safety demonstrations, and youth leadership programs that inspire the next generation.



BREAKING BARRIERS: A TRAILBLAZING JOURNEY

Some of Adams Electric's most inspiring progress comes through the courage of employees willing to break new ground. Cathy Waltz, of Littlestown, made history as the cooperative's first female employee to work "outside"—in the field, facing the elements and tackling the demanding physical challenges that come with maintaining rural electrical infrastructure.



Cathy's journey with Adams Electric began on March 14, 1988, when she was hired as a full-time switchboard operator and receptionist. But Cathy had bigger aspirations than answering phones! In 1992, she moved to the warehouse clerk position, gaining valuable hands-on experience with the equipment and materials that keep the lights on.

Her real breakthrough came in 2004 when Cathy transitioned to staking technician—a role that would take her directly into the field alongside the all-male line crews. Cathy found herself working storms in driving rain and bitter cold, staying out in harsh weather conditions for hours on end, and yes, even sleeping in her truck when emergency repairs demanded

round-the-clock attention.

While some might have seen these challenges as hardships, Cathy saw it as an opportunity to prove that dedication and skill matter more than outdated stereotypes. Her willingness to tackle any assignment, weather any storm, and work shoulder-to-shoulder with crews in the most demanding conditions helped pave the way for other women in the utility industry.

When Cathy retired in January 2021 after an incredible 33 years of service, she left behind more than just a stellar work record—she left a legacy of possibility. Her story reflects the broader evolution of Adams Electric itself: an organization willing to embrace change, value all contributions, and focus on getting the job done regardless of who's doing it. Her journey from receptionist to staking technician mirrors the cooperative's own growth from a small rural startup to the sophisticated utility operation serving our community today.

Cathy Waltz proved that dedication and perseverance can power more than just our homes and businesses. They can power change itself.

LOOKING FORWARD: THE NEXT CHAPTER

As Adams Electric celebrates this milestone anniversary, the cooperative continues evolving to meet tomorrow's energy challenges. From embracing renewable energy options to

modernizing the electrical grid with smart technology, Adams Electric remains committed to the same principles that guided those 65 founders in 1940: democratic control, community concern, and cooperation among cooperatives.

The cooperative model that seemed revolutionary 85 years ago has proven its staying power. In an era of corporate consolidation and distant decision-making, Adams Electric remains steadfast in its founding principles of local control and community partnership. As they like

to say, they truly are "The People Behind the Power."

CELEBRATING COMMUNITY POWER

Adams Electric Cooperative's 85th anniversary isn't just a celebration of eight decades in business—it's a testament to what communities can accomplish when they work together toward a common goal. From those first power lines strung across Adams County farmland to today's sophisticated electrical infrastructure, the cooperative has remained true to its original mission: providing reliable, affordable electricity while strengthening the communities it serves.

Here's to 85 years of lighting up lives and powering progress in south-central Pennsylvania. The future looks bright when the power truly belongs to the people.

As the 75th Anniversary of The Totem Pole Playhouse's operation continues, Dolly Parton's Broadway hit, 9 to 5, was a smashing success. The show ran through July 6 and with a cast of twentyfive local and extraordinarily talented actors and crew.

First premiering as a hit film in 1980, the story follows the antics of a business wherein the culture is less than ideal, and not so subtly depicts a bit of reality for the times. The show represented working women's struggles in business and society at the time.

Three smart, capable, female employees (including one new hire) find themselves under the supervision of a chauvinistic boss within a toxic culture. Determined to implement change, they take matters into their own hands to teach their incorrigible boss a lesson. The result is a cultural redirection which leads to muchneeded employee empowerment.

However, some not so creative accounting practices are uncovered when the three co-conspirators physically remove the incorrigible boss from the organization in hopes that he will learn the error of his ways. In the end, and on their own, the women go on to create an empowering, more successful business model through cultural change resulting in greater employee satisfaction.

The serious, often exaggerated, and humorous jabs against female employees is not lost in the performance. However, the much needed and sometimes satiric solutions initiated by the three women result in a changed culture, improved employee satisfaction, as well as a stronger bottom line.

To say that this show is dynamic is a vast understatement. The rapid set changes, palpable high energy, enlivening music, powerhouse vocals, and professional acting combine to evoke emotion (and especially for those of us who worked during that era - empathy).

"9 to 5 is the show our community has been asking for", says producing Artistic Director Ryan B. Gibbs. "It's smart, it's hilarious, and full of joy."

Travel back in time and enjoy this rare opportunity to visit inside five historic barns near Gettysburg. Kids under 18 are free, so bring your grandchildren - parents bring your kids!

The Historic Gettysburg Adams County Preservation Society's (HGAC) "Historic Barns Tour of Gettysburg and Adams County" will be held rain or shine on Saturday, September 20 from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. The tour includes privately owned barns that are not usually open to the public and were not on the Tour last year.

Advance tickets may be purchased on line until September 18 through Eventbrite -- or visit HGAConline.org and click on the Barn Tour link. Adults are \$35 in advance, and \$40 on the day of the event. All kids under 18 are free, and must be accompanied by an adult. For additional information, contact Steve Boggs at (240) 899-3515 or slboggs@comcast.net.

The tour begins at the historic Round Barn at 298 Cashtown Road, Biglerville. Participants should check in between 10 a.m. and noon, and will receive a booklet and map showing the barn locations on the tour. After exploring the Round Barn and Farm Market, participants can then drive to any barn on the tour, in any order and stay as long as they wish. The tour ends at 4 p.m.

"We hope that parents and grandparents will bring their kids to see inside these great old barns," said event volunteer, Bob McIlhenny.

Each barn will feature activities throughout the day that are fun and educational. There will be a cider press and cider tastings, and demonstrations of timber framing techniques as well as the use of a shaving horse and draw knife. Local artists and crafters will be displaying and selling their art works in the barns. The Panera Tatters will demonstrate tatting and lacemaking, and Civil War living history characters will tell of life in the mid-1800's, when the barns on the tour were built.

Proceeds from this event will benefit the award-winning HGAC Barn Preservation Project and Grant Program which has provided matching grant funding to over 65 owners of historic barns in Adams County, since 2013.

The last six months have been an extremely busy time for the Land Conservancy of Adams County (LCAC) with a number of easement closings ensuring the protection of agricultural beauty for coming generations.

The 83-acre property of Sara and Jamey Tatman in Cumberland Township borders Marsh Creek and is nearly surrounded by other preserved properties. It is half-woods and half pasture, accommodating their new family home as well as horses, goats, pigs, alpacas, highland and longhorn cattle, chickens, and guineafowl. Owner Sara Tatman feels strongly about preserving the land - "We see nothing but farmland being turned over to residential and other developments. We want to be among the select few who preserve farmland in this area."

"We had significant help to get this conservation easement to the finish line," according to Sarah Kipp, LCAC's land conservation director. She said funding was put together from the Adams County Community Foundation's Giving Spree, as well as a grant from the county's Green Space Grant Program and a donation from the American Battlefield Trust.

In the heart of Adams County's extensive fruit belt, Boyer Nurseries and Orchards has preserved 159 acres in two conservation easements in Franklin Township. The easements connect to 900 acres preserved a decade ago and complete

the preservation of 'The Home Farm' with over 1,000 acres now permanently preserved! Rainfall and springs on Boyer's property drain to Marsh Creek, providing drinking water for Gettysburg residents. "We know there are a lot of natural springs and vernal pools in the woodland behind the farm and it's an important water resource, so limiting development in this area was really important to us", said Emma Lower, a fifth-generation co-manager.

The Land Conservancy purchased both easements on Boyer's orchard land and forest with funding from the Natural Resources Conservation Service's Agricultural Conservation Easement Program, the Adams County Green Space Grant Program, and LCAC's own funds raised through the Adams County Community Foundation's annual Giving Spree.

Dave Salisbury, LCAC president, "We thank these private landowners for entering into protective agreements with our organization, thereby demonstrating their vision for the future."

In the 30 years since its founding in 1995, the organization has worked with local landowners to preserve more than 13,800 acres in the county through 197 separate easements. The Land Conservancy of Adams County is a fully accredited, membersupported nonprofit land trust that works to preserve the rural lands and character of Adams County. 



Mason-Dixon Clay Busters: Building Champions On and Off the Field

From humble beginnings to national competition, this local youth shooting program hits the mark with character development and community spirit.

It began with just 11 young athletes and a passion for clay target shooting. Now, the Mason-Dixon Clay Busters program has evolved into a powerhouse team that serves youth from multiple counties and states, developing not just skilled marksmen but confident young leaders.

More Than Just Hitting Targets

For the uninitiated, clay target shooting might seem mysterious. Athletes aim at clay targets—often called "clay pigeons" launched into the air at varying angles and speeds. It's a sport that demands precision, focus, and remarkable self-control.

"It's fast, fun, and requires incredible concentration," explains a team coach. "Every target presents a unique challenge, testing both physical skill and mental focus." But what makes this program truly special goes far beyond marksmanship. Young participants develop discipline, responsibility, and a deep respect for safety protocols. The team environment fosters camaraderie where athletes support each other through victories and disappointments alike.

Safety First, Always

For parents who might hesitate at the mention of youth shooting sports, the program's emphasis on safety provides reassurance. Before handling any equipment, every athlete undergoes comprehensive safety training. The program maintains strict protocols during all practices and competitions.

"Clay target shooting is actually one of the safest youth sports available due to these rigorous standards," notes a veteran coach. "We reinforce safe habits constantly—it's the foundation of everything we do."

This commitment to safety has helped dispel common misconceptions about the sport. Many families join with no prior firearms experience and find themselves embraced by a supportive community dedicated to positive youth development.

Transformative Impact

The changes observed in participants tell the real story of the program's value. Athletes consistently demonstrate growth in confidence, focus, and responsibilityqualities that extend into their academic and personal lives.

Success stories abound within the team's history. Nervous beginners have developed into national champions. Others have earned collegiate scholarships. Perhaps most meaningful are the quiet victories: shy teens finding their voice or experienced athletes mentoring newcomers.

"We've seen real maturity and personal growth," shares a longtime volunteer. "Many of our athletes become more confident, focused, and responsible-both on and off the field."

Community Connections

The program thrives through strong community partnerships, with Glen Rock Shooting Club serving as the team's home base and strongest supporter. This relationship has been instrumental in making it possible for hundreds of young athletes to discover their passion for shooting sports.

Families and volunteers remain deeply involved in every aspect of the program. Local businesses and sponsors contribute to events that bring the wider community together while raising awareness about youth development and firearm safety.

Looking Ahead

Now in its 19th year, Mason-Dixon Clay Busters continues to evolve through the dedication of its volunteer coaching staff. The program faces the positive challenge of growth-maintaining its strong foundation of mentorship and sportsmanship while expanding opportunities for more young athletes.

The team will competed at the SCTP National Team Championships in Columbus, Ohio, on July 19-20, 2025, representing our community on the national stage.

Bison Pumps - The Water Filter Dilemma

While the answer to this question is still evolving, the current answer may go something like this:

There are many filter options for water treatment. One of the best we've found and recommended to customers is the Berkie Water Filter. It is a stainless steel canister that you pour water into at the top. The water drains out a spout valve at the bottom. It IS expensive, though, around a couple hundred dollars.

If you want a filter that will screw onto the spout of your Bison hand water Pump, you could use an RV-style water filter. After one year of use, toss it and install a new one. They are much less expensive, probably around the \$20 range. The only problem with a filter on the spout is that it applies back pressure on the packing gland. The pressure gets worse as the filter gets dirty.

As this is a recurring question, the team at Bison is researching the best methods and ways to incorporate the filters into our pumps.


