A Legacy of Hospitality:

t Hickory Bridge Farm, guests don't just dine and stay—they become part of a story that began over three centuries ago. Since 1982, Mary Lynn Martin has managed the family business that she took over from her parents who purchased it in 1977. Today, she operates one of the region's most beloved destinations, where historic charm meets exceptional hospitality.

The property's extraordinary history begins in the late 1600s when the King of England granted this land to Charles Carroll, father of the signer of the Declaration of Independence. The first settler, John Carrick, built the clay brick farmhouse around 1750—the same building where bed and breakfast guests stay. Carrick's son Samuel later founded what became the University of Tennessee, while John himself lived to nearly 100, making his 1812 death newsworthy for the era.

Through the Civil War years under the Herring family's ownership, soldiers found refuge here, with some reportedly escaping up the hollow into the mountains. The most dramatic chapter came in 1887 when lightning struck the owners at the time, the Heintzelman family's barn, destroying their entire harvest and livestock. The replacement barn they built with oak and chestnut beams now serves as the farm's stunning restaurant, where several Heintzelman descendants still gather for dinner, connecting past to present.

After the Deardorff and Scott families' stewardship—including the Scotts' establishment of the restaurant in the early 1960s—Mary Lynn's parents, the Hammetts, purchased the struggling property in 1977. Having just sold the Fairfield Inn, they envisioned serving family-style dinners in this historic setting.

Today, Hickory Bridge Farm Restaurant, Wedding Venue and Bed & Breakfast serves the community with diverse offerings that honor both its heritage and modern needs. During weekdays and Saturday afternoons, the restaurant opens exclusively to groups and private parties, providing an intimate setting for business meetings, family gatherings, and special celebrations. On Friday and Saturday evenings, plus Sunday afternoons, the public can experience the farm's signature old-fashioned cuisine crafted with local ingredients.

"All meals feature an old fashioned cuisine with local ingredients," Mary Lynn explains, describing how each dish showcases the region's agricultural bounty. The menu celebrates traditional cooking methods and seasonal produce, creating memorable dining experiences that transport guests to simpler times while satisfying contemporary tastes.

The bed and breakfast accommodations offer guests a choice between charming cottages and rooms within the historic 1750 farmhouse. Each option provides a unique window into the property's rich past while delivering modern comfort and convenience. Guests wake up surrounded by the same beauty that has graced this land for centuries, yet enjoy all the amenities expected in today's hospitality industry.

The farm's wedding venue services have become increasingly popular, with couples drawn to the romantic setting where history and natural beauty create an unforgettable backdrop for their special day. 



lose to Arendtsville sits a home with stories and family etched into every corner. For Nicole and Jason Suski, this charming Sears kit house—lovingly assembled by Nicole's grandfather and great-grandfather decades ago—represents more than just a place to live. It's a living connection to family heritage that has shaped their values, influenced their career paths, and ultimately led them to their newest adventure in downtown Gettysburg with crEATe @ 48 on York Street.

"Most of my childhood memories and holidays took place in this home," Nicole shares with a nostalgic smile. "Keeping the property in the family was incredibly important to me." The couple has now called this special place home for 15 years, surrounded by fruit orchards that change with the seasons.

Some love stories unfold slowly over time, but Jason and Nicole's relationship moved with the swiftness of a well-orchestrated fivecourse meal. They first met as roommates in Charleston, South Carolina, where their friendship guickly blossomed into something more. After just eight months of dating, they were engaged!

Their favorite memory together takes them across the Atlantic to their first European adventure. While Jason, ever the chef, relished sampling culinary delights and visiting his sister in England, Nicole still erupts in laughter recalling their misadventure on a double-decker bus in the pouring rain. "The bus driver completely forgot we were up top," she recounts with amusement dancing in her eyes. "Thank goodness Jason's sister noticed we were heading in the wrong direction, though we still had to hoof it back MILES from where we were supposed to be dropped off!" The funniest part? "We scared the dickens out of the bus driver when we came 'downstairs.' He thought his bus was empty!"

A Culinary Legacy

For Jason, cooking isn't just a profession—it's a family tradition. Growing up in the kitchen alongside his father, Chef Tom Suski, he discovered his passion for food at an early age. This natural affinity led him to Johnson and Wales, where he earned his AOS in Culinary Arts before embarking on an impressive career journey.

"After school, I spent eight years in Charleston working at various highend restaurants and as Executive Chef at Middleton Inn," Jason explains. His path eventually led him to become Director of Culinary Development for 62 contract food service locations on the East Coast-valuable experience that later molded his approach to their own establishment.

Nicole's path weaves through different industries but always circles back to one consistent theme: creating experiences that bring







joy to others. With a BS in Psychology from The College of Charleston(CofC), she initially fell in love with hospitality and tourism during her college visit.

"The moment I stepped out of my parents' car while visiting CofC as a high school student, I knew I had found something special," she recalls. Though hospitality didn't become an official major until her senior year, Nicole gained what she calls her "most impressive knowledge" working the front desk of the top-rated Holiday Inn in customer satisfaction.

After a five-year detour into accounting, Nicole realized her true passion was "people

pleasing," which guided her back to hospitality—specifically sales and catering at the family-owned Altland House, where she worked for 11 years before joining forces with Jason in their current venture.

Despite their busy schedules, the Suskis find time to embrace life's simple pleasures. Nicole maintains her youthful spirit by assembling Legos, working on puzzles, and crafting. Jason, who spends countless hours in professional kitchens, seeks balance through outdoor activities.

"He really enjoys just being outside when not at the restaurant," Nicole shares. "Long walks with our puppy and hikes through the woods help him recharge."

Speaking of puppies, their household wouldn't be complete without Puddin', their 10-year-old terrier mix adopted from a foster family in Spring Grove via Rocky's Rescue. This sweet rescue follows in the pawprints of her "sisters" Kool-Aid and Jell-O, continuing the couple's commitment to giving shelter pets loving homes.

While they don't have children of their own, family remains central to their lives. "We love spending as much time as possible with our nieces and nephew," they share—passing down the joy of gathering around good food and creating memories.






Beyond their home life, the Suskis believe in giving back. Nicole sits on the Arendtsville Board of Elections and works the polls during almost every election, embodying their commitment to community involvement. The couple's appreciation for their surroundings runs deep. "We love the small-town feel and abundance of fresh, local produce and meats right in our backyard!" This connection to local agriculture naturally influences their approach to cooking, with menus that reflect what's currently thriving in nearby fields and farms.

"We're loving being part of the community in downtown Gettysburg," they share warmly. "We felt and continue to feel such a welcome from everyone!"

Established in 1955 by twin brothers Donald and Harold Hollabaugh, Hollabaugh Bros., Inc., has evolved into a fourthgeneration farm operation dedicated to land stewardship, highquality produce and community engagement. Their support helps sustain one of the most tangible elements of the Eisenhowers' post-presidential life in Gettysburg.

"Each year, the vegetable garden is cared for by dedicated volunteers and used by our interpretive staff to tell the story of the Eisenhower family's life here in Gettysburg," said Phillip Brown, Supervisory Park Ranger at Eisenhower National Historic Site. "In the spirit of the Eisenhower family's mission of community improvement, the produce harvested from the garden is donated to the South Central Community Action Programs (SCCAP) food pantry."

Ninety Years Strong:

The Moose Family **Reunion Celebrates** Nearly a Century of Love, Laughter, and Legacy

hat began as a simple gathering of 52 family members on a Maryland lawn in 1934 has blossomed into one of our area's most enduring family traditions. The Moose-Kittinger family reunion, now celebrating its 90th year, stands as a testament to the power of family bonds and the importance of preserving heritage across generations.

Their story begins with two determined sisters, Cora Alberta Myers-Moose and Mary Virginia Myers-Kittinger, who had a vision that would unite their extended family for decades to come. In 1934, these 2 women organized the very first reunion at the home of John and Cora Moose near Westminster, Marvland. where lunch was served. Little did they know they were launching a tradition that would endure world wars, economic hardships, and even a global pandemic.

A Tapestry of Treasured Traditions


Over nine decades, the Moose-Kittinger reunion has continued beloved customs that family members eagerly anticipate each year. The gathering wouldn't be complete without the rounds of bingo, the popular cake walks, and the always-entertaining auctions that help fund future reunions. Children's laughter fills the air during specially planned games, while group sing-alongs create memories that echo long after the last note fades.

Religious tradition holds a special place in the family's heart, with many reunions closing on the poignant notes of "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," a hymn that never fails to bring tears to eyes. The late Howard Moose's sermons became legendary fixtures, while talented family members continue to share their musical gifts, creating soundtrack memories for each gathering.

The reunion's competitive spirit prevails with various contests recognizing the oldest and youngest attendees, those who traveled the furthest distances, and the creators of the most mouth-watering desserts. These friendly competitions are the topic of countless stories and good-natured rivalries that span generations.

From Lawn to Hall: A Journey Through Venues

While the reunion began on that Westminster lawn, the growing family has called many places home over the years. The celebration has found welcoming spaces at South Mountain Fair Grounds, Littlestown Fish & Game, St. John's Lutheran Church Social Hall in Littlestown, Harney Fire Hall in Taneytown, Maryland, and Taneytown Memorial Park. Each venue has added its own character to the family's collective memory book.

family's story lives on through meticulously maintained minutes, treasurer's reports, newspaper clippings, and a comprehensive family history book filled with precious memories. The digital age has brought new tools, with family genealogy now preserved on Ancestry.com, ensuring that future generations can easily trace

These written records complement the oral history tradition, where stories pass from grandparents to grandchildren like precious heirlooms, each telling adding new layers to the family narrative.

Weathering History's Storms

Throughout 90 years, the reunion has reflected the broader sweep of American history. World War II brought both separation and celebration as family members served their country and later returned to joyful homecomings. The COVID-19 pandemic tested the family's resolve, but their commitment to staying connected proved stronger than any challenge.

Each gathering honors life's milestones—celebrating births and marriages while lovingly memorializing those who have passed. Veterans receive special recognition for their service, and the family takes particular pride in honoring Enola Briggs, the remarkable woman who attended the very first reunion as an infant in 1934 and remains the sole surviving member of that inaugural gathering. Enola's father, Raymond, was the son of William Moose, brother to John Moose, one of the reunion's original founders.

Eight Generations and Counting

Today's reunions typically welcome 45 to 60 family members representing eight to nine generations, with attendance varying based on significant family events. The tradition of introductions allows newer generations to share their connection to the original family members, creating bridges between past and present that strengthen with each telling.

The Moose children gathered at the home of the parents, Mr. and Mrs Jew D Moose, Westminster R.D. #1 on Sept. 2 1934 and organized a Moose reunion naming the following officers.
President Mr Albert Moose

Vice Pres. Mr Chester Moose Secretary Mr. Howard Moose Treasurer Mrs. Flora Miller Historian Miss Christine Moose Frogam Comm. Mr. Clarence Moose

They decided to meet again next year the Sunday before Lebor Day the palce to be named later.

At###### this time we were favored with the following restorations by Miss Merna Wengert, Mr. Merl Moose, Mr. Ray Moose, Mrs. Flora Miller, Miss Evelyn "oose, Miss Geraldine Moose, Mr. Samuel farmon. Aguitar solo by Mr. Marlin Moose. Song by the Fairfield boys.

A short talk by Mr. Albert Moose, Mrs. James Donaldson, Chester Moose and Howard Moose.

The offering was then taken which amounted to \$2.15. Next we joined in the reunion song. The oldest person present was Mr. Charles Hoffmen. The youngest person # present was Miss Joy Mickley.

The meeting came to a close by all rising and singing "God be withe You Till We Meet Again.




A Milestone Celebration






